Call to Order

Acting Chair Mitchell called the meeting to order at 12:09 p.m.

ACTION ITEMS:

1. Recognize Funds, Execute and Amend Agreements for Installation and Maintenance of Air Filtration Systems, and Reimburse General Fund for Administrative Costs

U.S. EPA is executing a Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) and has asked South Coast AQMD to act as the SEP administrator to install and maintain air filtration systems at schools in environmental justice communities. This action is to recognize up to \$167,967 into the Air Filtration Fund (75). These actions are to also execute agreements to install and maintain air filtration systems in an amount not to exceed \$159,569, execute or amend access agreements with local school districts, amend contracts to purchase additional filters using unspent administrative funds, and reimburse the General Fund for administrative costs up to \$8,398 for SEP administration.

Mayor Mitchell asked if the amount of the SEP is enough for several schools. Staff responded that the funding is sufficient for one school and that the school closest to the World Oil facility is the likely candidate. Additional potential schools have also been identified in case installing filters at the closest school is not feasible.

2. Adopt Resolution Recognizing Funds for FY 2018-19 Carl Moyer State Reserve Program

In April 2019, CARB approved funding allocations for the FY 2018-19 Carl Moyer State Reserve Program using the same distribution and source categories as the previous year. The allocation for the South Coast AQMD is \$3,481,893, including 6.25% in administrative funds. The State Reserve funds must be used for off-road projects including construction, agricultural and industrial equipment that are eligible according to the 2017 Revisions of the Carl Moyer Program Guidelines. This action is to adopt a Resolution recognizing up to \$3.5 million in Carl Moyer State Reserve funds from CARB along with its terms and conditions for FY 2018-19.

Council Member Robinson inquired about the process with scrappage and replacement of equipment under the Carl Moyer Program. Staff explained the process of pre-inspecting the old equipment, the subsequent inspection of the replacement equipment, and the verification that the old equipment has been destroyed. Council Member Robinson also asked if there was a backlog with inspections, if there was adequate staffing and the duration of the process in general. Staff replied that due to heavy oversubscription for part of AB 134 funds, there was a 6- to 9-month cycle and although resources were not adequate at the time, AB 617 funds will allow for the hiring of additional resources. Bayron Gilchrist, General Counsel, and Mayor Mitchell indicated that Mayor Mitchell does not have a financial interest or conflict of interest, but Mayor Mitchell is required to note for the record that she is a member of CARB, which is involved in this item. Mayor Mitchell asked if State Reserve funding was primarily for off-road agricultural equipment. Staff explained that the State Reserve fund is focused primarily on offroad construction equipment; however, additional funding for off-road agricultural equipment is available under the Funding Agricultural Replacement Measures for Emission Reductions (FARMER) Program. Staff added that even with FARMER funding, off-road agricultural equipment is still severely underfunded due to the high demand.

INFORMATIONAL ITEM:

3. Renewable Transportation Fuel From Pyrolysis

Staff presented a status report on the KORE Infrastructure project that is intended to demonstrate a commercial scale pyrolysis system that converts various waste biomass feedstock into renewable natural gas and renewable hydrogen.

Mayor Mitchell asked if KORE's focus was on renewable natural gas (RNG) or renewable hydrogen production. Staff responded that this is a field test, and KORE will be assessing the viability of producing either or both renewable transportation fuels. KORE has expressed an interest in renewable hydrogen as they believe it will result in a higher economical value if the renewable hydrogen pathway is determined to have a lower carbon intensity and will subsequently generate more low carbon fuel standard and renewable identification number credits. SoCalGas has expressed an interest in both fuels. The RNG injected into their pipeline would help "decarbonize" their natural gas supply. Mayor Mitchell also asked if there is a plan to identify a permanent site. Staff responded that as part of the Rialto (commercial site) closure, KORE was to show reasonable further progress on the feasibility of their technology and identify a new commercial site. KORE has not yet provided a commercial location. Staff expects that KORE will want to remain at the SoCalGas Olympic site but SoCalGas is waiting until the outcome of the field testing at that site. Supervisor Bartlett also inquired about the expected capacity of the Olympic site project. Staff responded that the Olympic site is currently a field test project that is not intended or designed for any substantive production of fuels. The efforts, in general, focus on the testing of various feedstocks and monitoring various operating parameters to determine how they affect product.

Supervisor Bartlett asked about the timeline for the project. Staff responded that KORE expects construction efforts to be completed by the end of September. Following construction, the process will undergo commissioning to ensure all systems are functioning properly and responding to controls, and then testing.
