Chair Carlos Rodriguez called the meeting to order at 11:31 a.m.

Agenda Item #3 – Review of Follow-Up/Action Items

Mr. Derrick Alatorre reviewed the follow-up and action items from the previous meeting.

Mayor Rachelle Arizmendi asked if the advisory group needed to take action on meeting virtually every 30 days. Ms. Daphne Hsu indicated the Governing Board has taken action that applies to advisory groups and committees.

No public comment.

<u>Agenda Item #4 – Approval of Local Government & Small Business Assistance Advisory Group</u> 2021 Accomplishments and Seek Items for 2022 Goals & Objectives

Mr. Alatorre presented a summary of the 2021 accomplishments and 2022 goals and objectives of the LGSBA Advisory Group.

Mr. LaMarr suggested that California Air Resources Board's (CARB) forklift regulation be added as an agenda item to monitor and to enlist CARB to provide periodic briefings.

Mr. John DeWitt proposed adding the measuring of hard costs against results to the goals and objectives; for example, the costs of vapor recovery, double piping, and replacement of single-wall tanks to double-wall tanks. Mr. Alatorre stated that his understanding of the request is that it would be a cost benefit analysis whenever a rule is implemented, which he will work with staff on from the Planning, Rule Development and Area Sources (PRDAS) department, as well as Chair Rodriguez.

Ms. Rita Loof 1) requested an update on Rule 219; 2) offered a presentation by RadTech International on the latest developments in manufacturing, metal finishing, inks, coatings, and disinfectants; and 3) requested a presentation and update on CARB's Environmental Justice Advisory Committee that deals with the Assembly Bill (AB) 32 Scoping Plan.

Mr. David Rothbart requested a presentation on Rule 317, which is listed on the second page of the goals.

Mr. LaMarr referred to Mr. DeWitt's earlier proposal and indicated that the request may be for a retrospective analysis and not so much a cost benefit analysis. What Mr. LaMarr has in mind is a look back of five to seven years where staff presents a rule and attributes certain costs and benefits and will assert to the Board that the rule will eliminate certain toxics or emissions. Chair Rodriguez asked for a prioritization or specifics for the request, which will be further discussed in the January 2022 meeting.

Direction was made to the LGSBA members to email their top priorities regarding this item to Ms. Elaine Hills and Ms. Van Doan by January 7, 2022 and agendize this item for January 2022.

Action Item #1: Put on agenda a discussion on LGSBA priorities associated with the retrospective analysis requested by Mr. DeWitt and Mr. LaMarr.

Mayor Arizmendi made a motion to approve the 2021 accomplishments and 2022 goals and objectives, reflecting the directions and proposals of the advisory group members, with the exception of the retrospective analysis topic, which will be discussed in the January 2022 meeting.

Mr. Alatorre added that this motion also includes approving the 2021 accomplishments. Ms. Hsu stated that the additions today were Mr. LaMarr's request to add forklift regulations and Ms. Loof's request for updates on Rule 219 and AB 32. Ms. Loof stated she also wanted to add the presentation by industry on technology.

Mr. Todd Campbell requested to include the port MOU in the agenda.

Mr. Felipe Aguirre requested a discussion on the odor issues in the City of Vernon, update on rule implementation, and a briefing on the status of Quemetco.

Local Government & Small Business Assistance Advisory Group

2021 Accomplishments

Throughout the year, the Local Government & Small Business Assistance (LGSBA) Advisory Group receives information and/or provides direct input on a variety of policy initiatives and proposed regulations that affect local governments, small businesses, and the general public. Such input is of particular value to the staff and Governing Board members in the process of developing such items and approving them, respectively.

Where appropriate, new additions and/or revisions were made by staff to improve proposals or policies, based on LGSBA members' input. A wide variety of comments were received on each of these items from LGSBA members representing local governments, small businesses, and the communities in general. Further details may be found in the minutes of meetings where each item was discussed in depth.

Significant Items Addressed in 2021

Significant discussions were held during 2021 on many items. A few notable items that were addressed during 2021 are summarized below, while an additional list of topics discussed follows.

(1) Air Quality in 2020: Smog, Wildfire Smoke and Emission Changes from the COVID-19 Response Dr. Scott Epstein provided information on the anomalous air quality measurements and evidence for the factors influencing poor air quality in 2020. Dr. Epstein indicated that the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) does not consider drought, abnormal weather and possibly the pandemic as exceptional events; however, does consider wildfires. If the data for days which wildfires occurred were excluded, South Coast AQMD would still be in nonattainment with the 1-hour ozone standard; however, the 24-hour particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) standard could be attained. Dr. Epstein specified that there was an 80% reduction of light-duty vehicle traffic and 25% reduction of heavy-duty vehicle traffic resulting from the Safer-at-Home order in March. However, the reduction of heavy-duty vehicle traffic rapidly decreased to 10% and now it is back to normal.

(2) Update on Recent Air Quality Management Plan (AQMP) Related Activities

Mr. Zorik Pirveysian provided an update on the South Coast Air Basin Attainment Plan for the 2006 24-hour PM_{2.5} Standard, the Coachella Valley Extreme Area Plan for the 1997 8-hour Ozone Standard, and the 2022 AQMP development. Mr. Pirveysian stated that the 2016 AQMP specified a reduction of 108 tons/day of nitrogen oxide (NO_x) by 2023, which is a challenge and needs regulations or programs to achieve it. Dr. Sarah Rees indicated that South Coast AQMD continues to have ongoing discussions with the US EPA regarding current issues.

(3) Update on Assembly Bill (AB) 617 for 2021

Mr. Daniel Wong presented an update on the Assembly Bill (AB) 617 Program for 2021. Mr. Dan Garcia indicated during the initial selection of a community, there has already been a sense of the types of sources. When the community boundaries are defined, technical staff conducts an in-depth review of sources within the boundaries, which provides the baseline emissions and help identify emission reductions. Mr. Derrick Alatorre stated that South Coast AQMD continues to advocate for sustained funding for this program and hopes it would increase this year; however, fund allocation is dependent on the budget trailer bills.



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

- Reexamine AB 2766 Resource Guide considering state and local zero emission goals (e.g. EO N-79-20)
- Continue to advise jurisdictions on project eligibility, including:
 - Vehicle purchases
 - EV Charging Infrastructure
 - Remote Work







 - Achieved In Practice Example (PTO: Apr. 2020)
 - Boiler with Low NOx Burner
 - Max Heat Input Rate: 8.4 MMBTU/HR
 - Boilers are used to heat up the process water to keep the bacterial culture used to ferment the ethanol at the optimal temperature.
 - Emission Limits:

Emissions *	Current LAER Limit	Source Test	Proposed LAER Limit
NOx (ppmv)	12	5.7	7
CO (ppmv)	50	0.0**	50

 - Emission Limits:

- Roller Coater Paper and Film, with RTO for VOC Control
 - Achieved In Practice Example (PTO: Dec. 2016)
 - Manufacturing process involves casting of a vinyl film and application of the adhesive on the film
 - Coatings are applied in PTEs for 100% collection, which are vented to RTO
 - Three flow coaters vented to RTO with permit requirement of 1500F minimum temperature and 97% overall control efficiency
 - Source test was performed in 2016
 - 98.9% overall control efficiency
 - Methods 25.1/25.3

- Fumigation Methyl Bromide Fumigation Chamber ≥ 100,000 lb-CH3Br/year
 - Achieved In Practice Example (PTO: Feb. 2014)
 - San Luis Obispo County APCD
 - Using methyl bromide to fumigate vegetables/fruits prior to cooling and shipping
 - 86% overall control efficiency (Carbon Adsorption)
 - Source test was performed in 2013







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Part B- LAER/BACT Determination **Section II: Proposed New Listing**



- I.C. Engine-Compression Ignition ≥1,000 BHP, Stationary Emergency including Non-Agricultural and non-direct drive fire Pump
 - Bay Area AQMD has established a BACT guideline that requires the engines to meet the U.S. EPA's Tier 4 emissions standards
 - Achieved In Practice Example: MWH Data Center, Quincy, WA (2019)
 - 3.0, 1.5 and 1 MW diesel engines (compliance through source test)
- Proposed BACT/LAER Applies to Major Sources (Title V) and compliance achieved through:
 - Tier 4 Final Compliant ICE; or
 - EPA-Certified Tier 4 Final ICE



- Tier 4 Final Compliant ICE: One-time Initial test 5-mode weighted avg. D2 cycle and follow up testing every 3 years is required
- EPA-Certified Tier 4 Final ICE: No test required



 - Cogeneration unit, rated at 1,573 BHP

 - Emission Limits:
 - Comply with Rule 1110.2 for NOX, CO and VOC
 - Ammonia limit: 10 ppm @ 15% O₂
 - Source test was performed in 2019
 - Method 100.1 for NOX, CO and VOC
 - Method 207.1 for ammonia slip



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Other BACT Updates Overview, Part A and Part C



- Staff is proposing to add a narrow BACT exemption for non-ozone precursor emission increases associated with air pollution control (APC) equipment installations to comply with NOx BARCT standards
- Other air districts in California have a similar BACT exemption for sources that are complying with a BARCT requirement
- > BACT Exemption (PAR 1304)
 - (f)(1) Upon approval by the Executive Officer or designee, new or modified permit unit(s) to install add-on APC equipment for control of NOx emissions, shall be exempt from the BACT requirement of Rule 1303(a)(1) for any associated increase in PM₁₀ and/or SOx emissions caused by the operation of the add-on APC equipment provided ...
- > BACT policy will be updated based on amended Rule 1304
- Update Maximum Cost Effectiveness values

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Other BACT Updates



- Updates for Consistency with Rules and Regulations
 - Rules 1134, 1147, 1147.1, 1147.2, and 1304
 - Reg XIII and XX
 - Clarifications to Part D listings more user friendly
- > BACT Technical Assessment for Biogas Flares
 - Continue to monitor new/existing organic and food waste digestion and co-digestion flare projects for ammonia NOx impacts
