<u>Agenda Item #3 – Approval of Draft Letter on CARB's AB 617 Community Air Protection</u> <u>Blueprint</u>

Supervisor Hagman opened the discussion of the letter drafted by the LBSBA members regarding CARB's AB 617 program. Nicholas Sanchez, Assistant Chief Deputy Counsel, Legal, advised the Advisory Group that LGSBA meeting minutes are provided to the Administrative Committee as a written report for an agenda item. There are a total of eight Governing Board members serving on the LGSBA Advisory Group and the Administrative Committee, constituting a quorum of the South Coast AQMD Governing Board. To avoid a serial communication or development of a concurrence among the majority of the Governing Board to trigger a concern under the Brown Act, Mr. Sanchez advised the Governing Board members on the Advisory Group to abstain from the discussion of this item. Additionally, the LGSBA charter requires vote by no less than a quorum of the Advisory Group to adopt a formal recommendation for action by the Governing Board, which for this item requires eight Advisory Group members who are not Governing Board members. Although there is not a quorum, the Advisory Group could still forward a communication to the Administrative Committee or the Governing Board regarding this item. Michael Laybourn, Program Supervisor, Planning, Rule Development, and Implementation, provided an overview of Rule 1460 - Control of Particulate Emissions from Metal Recycling and Shredding Operations.

Paul Avila asked what the future of these types of operations are, such as the growth in metal shredding. Mr. Laybourn explained that it's dependent on population; it's not a rapidly expanding industry, but it has been described as a vital public service.

Mr. LaMarr referenced shearing and shredding operations and asked why one requires a permit and not the other. Mr. Laybourn explained that the shredding operation has the potential to pulverize the metals

into smaller pieces and recognized as a source of particulate matter; shearing is simply cutting like big scissors.

Mr. Avila asked if portable metal shredders were available. Mr. Laybourn replied there are none confirmed to be permitted or registered.

Mr. Eder commented on aluminum.

Dear Governing Board Members,

We are writing on behalf of the Local Government and Small Business Assistance Advisory Group to ask for your support, approval, and subsequent letter to the California Air Resources Board (CARB) requesting that industry trade groups and associations be seated on AB 617 Community Steering Committees (CSCs).

When the CARB Board initially voted to approve the Community Air Protection Blueprint, they did so without explicitly prohibiting industry trade groups and associations from participating on these committees but rather left it up to the air districts to decide.

Typically, trade groups and associations are non-profit, non-partisan, 501(c) organizations that represent hundreds or thousands of businesses (mostly small businesses) spread throughout the jurisdiction of most air districts, and not just in disproportionately impacted communities. Moreover, any recommendations, decisions, plans, and rules emanating from the deliberations by these CSCs are certain to be of significance to all the members of these trade groups and associations because they will have the potential to impact all of them regardless of the neighborhoods in which they reside.

We believe the inclusion of these organizations would serve to enhance everyone's goal of successfully implementing a fair and equitable Clean Air Protection Program for all stakeholders.

Therefore, we are asking for your support of the concept to allow industry trade groups and associations to be enrolled and seated as members of these CSCs and request that you send a letter to ask the same of the CARB Board.

Thank you for your continued commitment to improving air quality in our region.

Local Government & Small Business Assistance Advisory Group

2023 Accomplishments

Throughout the year, the Local Government & Small Business Assistance (LGSBA) Advisory Group receives information and/or provides direct input on a variety of policy initiatives and proposed regulations that affect local governments, small businesses, and the general public.

Where appropriate, new additions and/or revisions were made by staff to improve proposals or policies, based on LGSBA members' input. A wide variety of comments were received on each of these items from LGSBA members representing local governments, small businesses, and the communities in general. Further details may be found in the minutes of meetings, where each item was discussed in depth.

Significant Items Addressed in 2023

Significant discussions were held during 2023 on many items. A few notable items that were discussed during 2023 are summarized below, while an additional list of topics discussed follows.

(1) Update on Clean Fuels Plan

Dr. Maryam Hajbabaei, Program Supervisor, Technology Advancement Office, provided an update of the Clean Fuels Plan. Most of the funding is from Department of Motor Vehicles registrations and is used for research, development, demonstration, and deployment of clean technologies. The majority of the funding is allocated to zero-emission technologies. The goal is to expand the use of zero-emission technologies. The Clean Fuels Program is re-evaluated annually to develop the annual Clean Fuels Plan Update based on a reassessment of the technology progress and direction for the agency and provides a new focus on technology development for zero-emission infrastructure.

(2) Summary of Compliance and Enforcement Activities for 2022

Terrence Mann, Deputy Executive Officer, Compliance and Enforcement, provided an update on inspections, complaint investigations, and enforcement activities during the last calendar year, including a brief discussion of how enforcement works and what happens after notices of violations are issued. There are approximately 85 inspectors that are assigned to inspect facilities such as refineries, power plants, landfills, chemical manufacturing operations, auto body shops, etc. Inspection highlights in 2022 included 334 Title V and 87 hexavalent chromium electroplating and chromic acid anodizing facility inspections, over 11,000 complaint investigations, and 232 major sources/RECLAIM inspection and emission audits.

(3) Update on South Coast AQMD Mobile Source Incentive Programs

Alyssa Yan, Program Supervisor, Technology Advancement Office, provided an overview on South Coast AQMD mobile source incentive programs, including Carl Moyer, Proposition 1B Goods Movement, Lower-Emission School Bus, and Replace Your Ride, and a few others. Funding for these programs is approved by South Coast AQMD Governing Board as contracts, and the funds are available until these contracts are completed. In 2022, \$237M was funded through these incentive programs and reductions of 595.6 tons per year of nitrous oxides (NOx) and 11.2 tons per year of particulate matter (PM) emissions were achieved.


In 2022, U.S. EPA approved a new motor vehicle emissions model (EMFAC) which generates higher emissions, leading to a transportation conformity lockdown (e.g., federal funding freeze for new projects)

South Coast AQMD and CARB requested a bump-up to "extreme" in 2023 to resolve the conformity lockdown

U.S. EPA approved the request and set October 7, 2024 as a due date for a SIP revision

New attainment year is 2031, aligned with South Coast Air Basin. Strategies to attain the standard for the South Coast Air Basin will lead Coachella Valley to attainment

An attainment plan is under development and will be brought for the Board's consideration this fall
