Call To Order

Mr. Derrick Alatorre called the meeting to order at 12:31 p.m., and Ms. Aisha Reyes took the roll call.

Ms. Reves stated there was one action item from the August 18, 2021 meeting:

• Schedule a presentation on Rule 2306: The Intermodal Indirect Source Rule. The presentation is scheduled for today's meeting.

Agenda Item #1: Approval of August 18, 2021 Minutes

Mr. Jose Trinidad Castañeda pointed out a typo in his name. Staff will make the correction.

Ms. Cassie Nguyen moved for the approval of the minutes from August 18, 2021. Ms. Roxana Barrera seconded the motion. Minutes were approved.

Agenda Item #2: Hydrogen and Fuel Cell Presentation

Mr. Seungbum Ha delivered a presentation on Hydrogen and Fuel Cell Technologies.

Ms. Janielle Vidal asked about the expansion of hydrogen fuel cell refueling sites in Southern California. South Coast AQMD supports two tracks to expand refueling facilities for light duty and heavy-duty vehicles. CARB has a long-term plan to expand over 100 refueling stations.

Mr. Jose Trinidad Castañeda asked which regulatory authority would advocate to prioritize the most environmentally sound fueling sources. The California Energy Commission and Air Resources Board would have the most influence over this issue.

Mr. Castañeda asked how much buy-in from city governments and/or consumers would be necessary before investment in hydrogen vehicles and infrastructure becomes competitive. Mr. Ha stated the heavy-duty fleets and the trucking industry would have most influence on adoption and further expansion.

Agenda Item #3: Rule 2306: Indirect Source Rule for New Intermodal Facilities Presentation

Ms. Lijin Sun delivered a presentation on Proposed Rule 2306: Indirect Source Rule for New Intermodal Facilities.

Ms. Ana Gonzales asked whether there was a timeline for the proposed rule to come before the Governing Board, so YLAC could meet ahead of the board date and draft a recommendation. Mr. Alatorre stated YLAC could be kept apprised of the status of the proposed rule.

Mr. Castañeda asked what the status is and what progress has been made in rail transport technology. Staff responded that there is a strong interest in moving toward zero-emission locomotives and the next steps would include increased commercialization of the technology and the infrastructure.

Mr. Castañeda asked which entities would be involved in promoting the infrastructure and support for the updates in technology. Staff responded that new intermodal facilities are built from the ground up provide a good opportunity to integrate new technologies into their facility.

Ms. Roxana Barrera asked how members could become involved in the processes for rule development and updates. Ms. Sun responded that members can use the contact information at the end of the presentation to sign up for the mailing list. Anyone can participate in working group meetings or can contact staff directly.

Mr. Michael Rodriguez asked why the specific facilities had been selected for focus. Staff responded that these two proposed new railyards are located in relation to communities (especially environmental justice communities) and the expected level of emissions from the proposed facilities.

Mr. Rodriguez asked how PR 2306 differs from Rule 2305, the Warehouse Indirect Source Rule. Staff responded that 2305 applies to both future and existing warehouses, where PR 2306 is focused on new intermodal facilities.

Mr. Rodriguez asked whose jurisdiction would the new facilities would fall under. Staff reponded that the proposed SCIG facility would fall under the jurisdiction of the Port of Los Angeles. The proposed Colton facility would fall under the jurisdiction of the California High-Speed Rail Authority.

Agenda Item #4: Member Updates

Mr. Castañeda has begun working in the city manager's office for the City of Irvine, and the office is currently seeking information on air quality sensors to invest in to monitor the situation with All American Asphalt. **Action Item: Staff to confer for recommendation.**

Mr. Castañeda expressed concern for the engagement and participation of members.

Ms. Janielle Vidal will be hosting a panel at the upcoming Environmental Justice Conference and encouraged members to attend.

Ms. Ana Gonzales shared that the City of Colton would be holding a meeting regarding air quality and the city's moratorium on warehouse development, invited members, and offered to share meeting information via email.

Call To Order

Mr. Derrick Alatorre called the meeting to order at 12:33 p.m., and Ms. Aisha Reyes took the roll call.

Agenda Item #1: Approval of August 18, 2021 Minutes

Agenda Item #2: Adoption of YLAC Goals and Objectives for 2022

Mr. Jose Trinidad Castañeda moved to approve the adoption of the Goals and Objectives. Mr. Michael Rodriguez seconded the motion. YLAC Goals and Objectives for 2022 were approved.

Agenda Item #4: Update on Assembly Bill AB 617 for 2021

Mr. Daniel Wong presented an update on AB 617.

Mr. Jose Trinidad Castañeda inquired whether new upcoming legislation would impact AB 617 program implementation. Derrick Alatorre responded if the CERP and CAMP documents have already been approved, new legislation would not impact program goals, with possible exceptions.

Ms. Kyla Kelly asked about implementation of air monitoring equipment and what pollutants were being measured. Daniel Wong responded that low-cost PurpleAir sensors have been deployed in the communities to volunteers. Kelly Gamino stated each community has a dedicated web page for updates on pollutants measured and air quality conditions.

Mr. Michael Rodriguez asked how the monitoring data is made available to members of the community and what would be done with that data. Daniel Wong responded South Coast AQMD monitoring teams are preparing monitoring dashboards to carry and report comprehensive data. Mr. Rodriguez asked what the difference is between the various monitoring and reporting tools used by South Coast AQMD and CARB. Daniel Wong stated that CARB tools monitor and report on communities throughout the state, while South Coast AQMD has only six of the fifteen communities within its jurisdiction. Plans for future updates will ideally bring the different tools into communication with each other for more comprehensive results.

Agenda Item #3: Technology Advancement Projects Presentation

Ms. Frances Maes delivered an update on Technology Advancement projects.

Mr. Jack Symington asked if there is room within the programs to elevate the importance of eliminating greenhouse gasses. Frances Maes responded due to state reduction guidelines, certain programs are focused on criteria pollutants, while other programs are in development to focus on reducing greenhouse gas emissions.

Agenda Item #5: Member Updates

Mr. Jose Trinidad Castañeda announced the cities of Irvine, Fullerton, Buena Park, and Huntington Beach recently voted to transition to 100% renewable energy through Orange County Power Authority. He also shared that SoCal Edison broke ground on a research hub for electric truck technologies.

Ms. Roxana Barrera requested a presentation updating the council on the intermodal facilities ISR. ACTION ITEM: Staff to look into the current status and potential for future presentation on the ISR.

Mr. Castañeda requested a presentation and update on the All American Asphalt facility in Irvine. ACTION ITEM: Staff to determine whether a presentation is appropriate as information is available on the South Coast AQMD website.

Mr. Michael Rodriguez requested recommendations for speakers to invite to speak before the UC Riverside Graduate Student Association for which he is president. **ACTION ITEM: Staff to share Mr. Rodriguez's email with council members.**



Health Effects of Ozone and PM Pollution

As an overview, criteria pollutants are:


Ozone

- Carbon Monoxide (CO)Sulfur Dioxide (SOx)
- Particulate Matter (PM)
 - Nitrogen Dioxide (NOx) Lead



Ozone


- Inflames and damages the airways
- Coughing, sore throat
- Makes lungs more susceptible to infection
- Aggravates lung diseases such as asthma, emphysema, and chronic bronchitis
- Increases the frequency of asthma attacks



Particulate Matter (PM)

- Increased chance of premature death in people with heart or lung disease
- Increase in heart attacks, irregular heartbeat
- Increased aggravated asthma, decreased lung function
- Increased respiratory symptoms, such as irritation of the airways, coughing or difficulty breathing
- Diesel PM is a highly potent carcinogen

Proposed New Intermodal Facilities Sited in EJ Communities




CalEnviroScreen: Mapping tool that helps identify California communities that are most affected by many sources of pollution

- Uses environmental, health, and socioeconomic information to assign scores for every census tract in the state
- An area with a high score is one that is more disproportionately impacted by pollution

Rulemaking Approach

- Previously proposed approach for this control measure considered existing rail yards only
 - No newly proposed railyards were under consideration at the time
- April 2020 Board update laid out a preliminary approach for existing rail yards
- BNSF proposed 2 new rail yards in 2021*



Preliminary concepts from 04/2020 Board Meeting

- Pivot in rulemaking approach reflects current conditions
 - Bifurcated rulemaking (new and existing)
 - Need to move quickly for new railyards to establish requirements before projects approved
 - Four working group meetings held since July 2021







South Coast AQMD 2022 Sponsored and High-Priority State Legislation



Key Support Bill

AB 1749 (C. Garcia) Community Air Protection Blueprint: community emissions reduction programs: toxic air contaminants and criteria air pollutants.

- Updates requirements of AB 617 Program to:
 - permit an additional year for completion of community emissions reduction programs (CERPs);
 - requires CARB to identify specified emissions reduction measures; and
 - makes changes to reporting by local air districts.



AB 2141 (E. Garcia) - Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund: community projects: funding.

 Continuously appropriates 20% of annual proceeds of Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, up to \$600 million, to CARB for allocation to air districts for supporting community emissions reduction strategies in, and reimbursement for participation by AB 617 communities.



AB 2836 (E. Garcia) – Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards Attainment Program: vehicle registration fees: California tire fee.

 Extends various fees that support Carl Moyer Memorial Air Quality Standards Attainment Program incentive funding for clean technology, for nine years, starting January 1, 2024 until December 31, 2033.



AB 2910 (Santiago) – Nonvehicular air pollution: civil penalties.

 Increases maximum civil penalties for air pollution violations, including tripling the penalty caps for strict liability.



AB 2852 (Bloom) – Air pollution control districts and air quality management districts: independent special districts: funding.

 Designates an air district as an independent special district for purposes of receiving state and federal funds.
