## Draft Mitigated Negative Declaration (Draft MND) for the Proposed State Route 210 Mixed Flow Lane Addition

The South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) staff appreciates the opportunity to comment on the above-mentioned document. The following comments are meant as guidance for the lead agency and should be incorporated into the Final MND. The Project proposes to construct a mixed flow lane between Highland Avenue and San Bernardino Avenue.

In the Air Quality Analysis, the project's air quality emissions during construction were quantified but not compared to the SCAQMD's recommended regional CEQA thresholds to determine significance. In Table 3.6 – Estimate of Criteria Pollutant Emissions During Construction, the maximum daily NO<sub>X</sub> emissions are 109 lbs/day, which exceed the SCAQMD regional threshold of 100 lbs/day. In order to reduce the project's construction impacts, SCAQMD staff recommends that additional mitigation measures be included to reduce these impacts to a less than significant level. Additional details are included in the attachment.

The SCAQMD staff is available to work with the lead agency to address these concerns and any other air quality questions that may arise. ## Additional Construction Mitigation Measures

Based on the air quality analysis in the Draft MND, the proposed Project will exceed the SCAQMD's CEQA regional construction significance thresholds for  $NO_X$ . Therefore, SCAQMD staff recommends that, pursuant to Section 15126.4 of the CEQA Guidelines, the following measures be included in the Draft MND, in addition to the measures proposed by the lead agency, in order to minimize or eliminate significant adverse air quality impacts:

- Require the use of 2010 and newer diesel haul trucks (e.g., material delivery trucks and soil import/export) and if the lead agency determines that 2010 model year or newer diesel trucks cannot be obtained the lead agency shall use trucks that meet EPA 2007 model year NOx emissions requirements.
- Consistent with measures that other Lead Agencies in the South Coast Air Basin (including Port of Los Angeles, Port of Long Beach, Metro and City of Los Angeles)<sup>1</sup> have enacted, require all on-site construction equipment to meet the following:
  - All off road diesel-powered construction equipment greater than 50 hp shall meet the Tier 4 emission standards, where available. In addition, all construction equipment shall be outfitted with BACT devices certified by CARB. Any emissions control device used by the contractor shall achieve emissions reductions that are no less than what could be achieved by a Level 3 diesel emissions control strategy for a similarly sized engine as defined by CARB regulations.
  - A copy of each unit's certified tier specification, BACT documentation, and CARB or SCAQMD operating permit shall be provided at the time of mobilization of each applicable unit of equipment.
  - Encourage construction contractors to apply for SCAQMD "SOON" funds. Incentives could be provided for those construction contractors who apply for SCAQMD "SOON" funds. The "SOON" program provides funds to accelerate clean up of off-road diesel vehicles, such as heavy duty construction equipment. - Provide temporary traffic controls such as a flag person, during all phases of significant construction activity to maintain smooth traffic flow.
- Provide dedicated turn lanes for movement of construction trucks and equipment on- and off-site.
- Reroute construction trucks away from congested streets or sensitive receptor areas.
- Improve traffic flow by signal synchronization.
