

South Coast AQMD extends Windblown Dust Advisory for the Coachella Valley

Valid until Monday 11:59 p.m.



Current Conditions

 Windblown dust particle pollution levels (PM10) were elevated on Saturday night and Sunday morning. The highest hourly PM10 concentration reached Hazardous Air Quality Index (AQI) levels.

Forecasted Air Quality Impacts

- Windblown dust is expected to cause Air Quality Index (AQI) values to reach Unhealthy levels or higher through at least Monday
- AQI levels will vary over time and by location depending on wind speed and direction
- AQI levels will likely be highest in the afternoon and evening hours
- South Coast AQMD will issue an update if poor air quality is expected to persist

Detailed Forecast

Sunday night and Monday early morning	AQI levels of Unhealthy or higher are possible with the highest levels expected after 5 PM
Monday morning	Windblown dust is expected to subside throughout the morning hours as winds decrease
Monday afternoon and overnight	Windblown dust is expected to again cause Unhealthy or worse AQI levels starting after noontime

South Coast AQMD will issue an update if additional information becomes available.

If you are in an area impacted by windblown dust or ash:

- Limit your exposure by remaining indoors with windows and doors closed or seeking alternate shelter.
- Avoid vigorous physical activity.
- Run your air conditioning and/or an air purifier. If possible, do not use swamp coolers or whole house fans that bring in outside air.
- Help minimize dust pollution by stabilizing loose soils and slowing down if driving on dirt roads.
