10. Issue, and If Necessary Re-Issue, Program Announcement for the Replacement of Heavy-Duty Diesel Trucks and Authorize Execution of Contracts Under Proposition 1B-Goods Movement Program

Harvey Eder, Public Solar Power Coalition, stated his opposition because natural gas heavy-duty trucks only provide 50 percent NOx emission reductions. He stressed the importance of seeking zero emission alternatives such as solar renewable trucks.

In response to Mr. Eder's comment, Dr. Phillip Fine, DEO/Planning, Rule Development and Area Sources, explained that the new natural gas engines to be funded are 90 percent cleaner than current tailpipe standards.

Mr. Eder encouraged the Board to consider zero emission alternatives for the school bus replacements.

PUBLIC HEARING

32. Certify Final Environmental Assessment and Amend Rule 1168—Adhesive and Sealant Applications

Heather Farr, Program Supervisor/Planning, Rule Development and Area Sources, gave the staff presentation on Item 32.

Dr. Lyou inquired about Method 24 and reproducibility in UV cured coatings. Ms. Farr replied that Method 24, which was adopted in 1993, covers most UV curable products, the one exception is thin-film energy curable products.

Dr. Lyou added that he would propose a deadline of October 2018 for the test method guidance document to be brought back to the Board.

Dr. Parker inquired about the status of defining a sealant in certain applications which was previously a point of disagreement with industry.

Dr. Fine explained that spray foam insulation has been considered a sealant and the amendments to the rule clarify that definition. He added that this product is relatively new and once a technical assessment is conducted, an amendment to the rule may be brought back to the Board.

Council Member Buscaino inquired about products that have multiple test methods for determining compliance with VOC limits. Dr. Fine responded that a public process with stakeholders will be initiated in order to develop the test method guidance document. The intent is that each individual product will have one applicable test method which will be made clear by the guidance document.

The public hearing was opened; and the following individuals addressed the Board on Item 32.

Lindsay Stovall, American Chemistry Council Center for the Polyurethanes Industry, thanked staff for addressing industry input in the amendments and expressed concerns with identifying spray polyurethane insulation foam as a sealant. (Submitted Written Comments)

Doug Raymond, National Aerosol Association

Howard Berman, Tremco, Inc.

Expressed support for the rule amendments and thanked staff for working with the adhesive and sealant industries.

Fabio Castellani, Weld-On Adhesives, expressed support for the VOC limits for PVC and CPVC solvent cement that provide improvements to air quality. He added that Weld-On has invested in research and development to meet or exceed the VOC limits in Rule 1168 and these products are already available for purchase.

Curt Coleman, Southern California Air Quality Alliance, thanked staff for their work on developing the rule and requested more time for the sell-through period.

Rita Loof, RadTech International, expressed concern about test methods for UV/EV LED materials and requested more specificity in the rule. She also stated that recordkeeping requirements in the rule would be burdensome. (Submitted Written Comments)

Written Comments Submitted By: American Coatings Association

There being no further public testimony on this item, the public hearing was closed.

Council Member Mitchell requested clarification on the test method guidance document and the time needed to prepare the document.

Dr. Fine responded that the document will be brought to the Board as quickly as possible after the public process with stakeholders is completed. He added that some of the test methods may come before the Board sooner than some of the more complex methods.

Council Member Mitchell inquired about the recordkeeping requirements and extending the sell-through and use-through time periods.

Dr. Fine replied that there are no new recordkeeping requirements for end users. Manufacturers will be required to report every three years through 2025, then every five years, with a sunset date in 2040.

Ms. Farr explained that the sell through and use-through time period is similar to provisions in other rules and typically products are sold through in the first year.

Dr. Lyou noted that any advantage gained by the companies who have already invested in research and development to reduce VOC emissions is eliminated by the extended implementation period which allows competing companies additional time to reformulate and comply with the rule. He added that information about compliant products should be provided on the District's website for consumer use.

Dr. Fine explained that time is needed to allow manufacturers to reformulate and make the technical assessments and noted that super compliant product information is publicly available on the District's website for architectural coatings under Rule 314.

Mr. Nastri responded that the District's website is currently being redesigned and compliant product information will be more readily accessible in the future.

Chairman Burke and Mayor Cacciotti suggested additional outreach and education to contractors, the Contractors State License Board, and other government agencies about the availability of low VOC products.

Mr. Nastri commented on the District's outreach to government agencies and private organizations.

Dr. Parker expressed concern about promoting specific products on the District's website.

Mr. Nastri responded that the District's AQ-SPEC website is a good example of effectively providing information without promoting one product over another.

Council Member Robinson expressed support for extending the usethrough provisions in the Rule and inquired what outreach was done to industry during the rule development process.

Ms. Farr explained that outreach to industry on these amendments began in 2013 and continued to the present time, including numerous working group meetings and workshops.

Mr. Nastri commented that the sell-through provision is consistent with U.S. EPA provisions and the use-through provision could be extended to address concerns that have been raised.

Council Member Robinson inquired about recordkeeping and VOC emission reduction estimates provided in the AQMP.

Dr. Fine explained that the reporting requirement in the rule will provide an improved emission inventory and VOC emission reduction estimate.

Mayor Pro Tem Benoit noted that an additional speaker card had been submitted after the public comment period was closed.

Mark Brown, MPS Adhesives, commented on his experience reformulating PVC and CPVC pipe cements when Rule 1168 was originally adopted. He expressed concerns that some of the products displayed in the presentation do not meet ASTM standards.

Ms. Farr responded that the ASTM methods and standards for PVC, CPVC and ABS products will be reviewed as part of the technical assessment.
