

Keynote Speaker *Sofia Figueroa*

I'm Sofia, a filmmaker, born and raised in San Bernardino, CA. My passion is helping artists, businesses, and non-profit organizations tell their story through authenticity and empathy. Ever since I was a kid, I had always been fascinated with the arts and with serving my community. After high school, I attended California Baptist University and graduated with a Bachelors in Film Studies and a minor in Sociology. Through my college experience, I began partnering with local non-profits and community organizers to document their events, capturing stories that highlighted the voices and experiences of my community. This passion for storytelling eventually grew into directing impactful documentary work—most recently The Warehouse Empire, which earned me an Emmy Award.

I aim to craft work that resonates—bringing awareness, empathy, and authenticity to every documentary and local collaboration.



Afternoon Panel Moderator: Lucy Herrera

Lucy Herrera serves as the Executive Director of Legacy LA, a youth development organization located near the Ramona Gardens public housing community in Los Angeles. Legacy LA supports more than 500 young people annually through leadership development, academic support, civic engagement, and advocacy programs that center equity and social justice.

Born and raised in Ramona Gardens, Ms. Herrera was Legacy LA's very first youth participant in its founding Youth Council in 2008. Her lived experience in the community continues to shape her leadership and her deep commitment to addressing systemic inequities that affect under resourced neighborhoods. Under her direction, Legacy LA has expanded its work to include youth-led organizing and cross sector partnerships that elevate youth voices in policy, governance, and environmental justice.

Ms. Herrera holds a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science with a concentration in Law and Society from the University of California, Riverside. She is particularly passionate about empowering youth in Boyle Heights and Ramona Gardens to develop an intersectional lens to confront issues such as climate change, pollution, and public health disparities. Her leadership is grounded in the principles of equity, community empowerment, and the belief that youth must be at the forefront of social and environmental change.

In addition to her role at Legacy LA, Ms. Herrera serves as Vice Chair of the AltaMed Board of Directors, where she continues to advocate for inclusive, youth-centered approaches to community development and public policy.



Panelist Jan Victor Andasan

Jan Victor Andasan (Siya/They/Them/Theirs) is a queer non binary sober immigrant Pilipino. They immigrated and grew up in West Long Beach until their family settled in a home in Carson. Jan Victor attended UCLA and received a BA Asian American Studies with a concentration in Pilipin@ Studies. During their tenure at UCLA, they were involved with organizing students of color, LGBTQ issues, and various issues affecting underrepresented communities.

Jan Victor worked for 10+ years at East Yard Communities for Environmental Justice (EYCEJ) as both a Community Organizer in the Long Beach and South Bay region and the Fundraising and Development Director where they helped to break fundraising records. At their time in EYCEJ, Jan Victor fought alongside the community to stop Warren Buffet's proposed BNSF SCIG railyard and sued refineries and won. They helped shape policy on both freight and fossil fuel regulations in Southern California and beyond.

Jan Victor currently serves as Legacy LA Youth Development Corporation's first ever Development Director utilizing storytelling and the robust skills they developed in community organizing to secure funds to meet the needs in addressing the impact of multigenerational gang violence in the Ramona Gardens / Boyle Heights community. Additionally, Jan Victor continues to engage in environmental justice community organizing and strategizing with frontline communities as a consultant shaping policy and intentional community engagement.

Jan Victor has a passion for community organizing, social justice, fashion like bags and shoes, streaming video games and having political talks, and eating delicious food.



Panelist Angelica Balderas

Angie is a dedicated advocate and long-time community organizer for social justice who has lived in the Inland Empire for over 30 years. She works as a Digital Strategist/Organizer and Communications Coordinator for the People's Collective for Environmental Justice and serves on several boards, including the Environmental Justice Advisory Board for the South Coast Air Quality Management District and The Garcia Center of the Arts.

With over 20 years of experience, Angie has been involved in various social justice efforts, including labor organizing with UFCW Local 1167 and serving as a Lead National Organizer for the Sierra Club. She is also active in her community, having participated in student government at Cal State Northridge and San Bernardino Valley College to champion social justice issues. Also co-host and producer to The Artivist I.E a podcast that focuses on uplifting arts/activism here in the I.E. In 2021, she completed the Leadership, Organizing, and Action Program at Harvard University.

Outside of her activism, Angie enjoys spending time with her family and partner, enjoying simple activities like beach days and music-filled evenings.



Panelist Valerie Dobesh

I am a Mestiza, descendent of Spaniard and Purepecha. My passion is gardening, and I enjoyed managing retail nurseries for 17 years and my experience is both in mountain and inland valley gardening.

After my retirement from the retail nursery business, I was involved with mountain gardening clubs, which helped communities. This led me into mental health services. For many years I have studied with my Indigenous Elders and other Indigenous tribes on Native plant uses. For 15 years I've been a Master Herbalist and taught classes.

I am now retired from a Community Health Workers Program educating community on mental health wellness and linking them to resources in our community. Also I created a healing garden program with Riverside-San Bernardino County Indian Health, Inc. (RSBCIHI) and enjoyed working with the Diabetes Dept. and Nutrition Dept.

I am a Master Gardener with University of California cooperative extension. I take great pride in working and teaching hands-on with local communities. I have worked with community gardens throughout Southern California for many years.



Panelist Theral Golden

I have been a resident of Long Beach, CA, for more than fifty years, raising my family here and working in Los Angeles County throughout that time. Honorable discharge from the U.S. Navy. Entered service as an E1 and honorably separated services as an E5 Petty Officer after 3 years and 8 months.

My professional work was achieved as a Maintenance Manager, Operations Administrative Manager, and Service Operations Director. for the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transit Authority. Today, I am struggling for clean air in my community of West Long Beach, and against the racism and the racist policies that the local and state agencies are exacerbating the health of this Community. This community is disproportionately affected by pollution, particularly from the Ports of Long Beach and Los Angeles, California.
