VOLUNTARY SOUTHLAND GREENHOUSE GAS REDUCTION PROGRAM TO BE DEVELOPED

• n June 6, AQMD approved a preliminary plan for developing a greenhouse gas emission reduction program dubbed the SoCal Climate Solutions Exchange.

This program "will give businesses and individuals assurance that they are purchasing real carbon offsets and that they are investing in the local economy," said William Burke, AQMD's Chairman.

Companies could purchase carbon reductions from the exchange to mitigate emissions from new projects under the California Environmental Quality Act. Companies or individuals also could purchase these reductions to offset their "carbon footprint."

The SoCal Climate Solutions Exchange program will set up a mechanism allowing generation of greenhouse gas reductions within the AQMD's four-county jurisdiction. Reductions must meet strict criteria including following specific protocols and representing emission reductions that are in addition to any regulatory requirements.

AQMD will consider adopting incentives for reducing emissions in environmental justice areas – those with low household incomes and relatively high levels of air pollution.

Carbon emission reduction credits will be certified by AQMD and any exchanges will be registered and tracked. The program builds on AQMD's more than 30 years of experience in managing emissions reduction credits for nitrogen oxides, sulfur oxides, particulates and other pollutants. While the SoCal Climate Solutions Exchange is aimed at reducing emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases, it is likely to result in simultaneous reductions of smog-forming pollutants.

AQMD staff now will develop specific rules governing the program that will be considered by AQMD's Board this fall. The SoCal Climate Solutions Exchange is being closely coordinated with the state's implementation of AB 32, California's global warming emissions reduction program.

"Senator Boxer's commitment to the environmental clean-up of ocean-going ships will help protect the health of millions of Americans and is crucial to achieving health-based air quality standards in many areas of the nation," said AQMD Chairman William A. Burke, Ed.D. Burke presented the award to Sen. Boxer during a ceremony on the steps of a Santa Monica library. Sen. Boxer has long been a champion of environmental and air quality issues. "We commend Senator Boxer for her long-term, ongoing commitment to clean air issues including the promotion of zero-emission electric vehicles and the removal of subsidies for gas-guzzling SUVs," Burke said.

Marine Vessel Emissions Reduction Bill Successfully Passes out of U.S. Senate Committee

andmark legislation introduced by U.S. Senator Barbara Boxer that would require tougher pollution controls for container and ocean-going ships cleared a major hurdle after it successfully passed out of the U.S. Senate Committee on Environment & Public Works. The "Marine Vessel Emission Reduction Act" (S. 1499) was considered during a markup committee hearing in Washington, D.C. on May 21st. The hearing was presided over by Sen. Boxer, who is Chair of the committee.

The bill received bipartisan support in committee and now awaits consideration by the full Senate. "This legislation is key to efforts to reduce ship emissions, which are a significant source of air pollution not just in Southern California, but also in port areas across the nation," said William Burke, Ed.D., AQMD's Chairman. "We are very encouraged by the support it received today in the Senate Committee."

S. 1499 is co-sponsored by U.S. Sen. Dianne Feinstein and has a companion bill in the U.S. House of Representatives, H.R. 2548, authored by U.S. Congresswoman Hilda Solis. The legislation would require the federal government to adopt tougher

pollution controls for large ships in order to achieve substantial reductions in ship emissions. Specifically, the legislation would:

· Require foreign and domestic ocean-going ships to use low sulfur fuel within a certain number of miles from the U.S. coastline, by Dec. 31, 2010. Consequently, fuel sulfur content would be reduced from the current average of 27,000 parts per million (ppm) to a maximum of 1,000 ppm; and

 Require controls to be put on ship engines that would substantially reduce their emissions of nitrogen oxides (NOx), by Jan. 1, 2012.

ships are greatly reduced. In Southern California, it is estimated that approximately 800 premature deaths per year result from exposure to particulate pollution from large marine vessels. Furthermore, research shows that particulate pollution from oceangoing ships causes at least 2,000 to 5,000 premature deaths per year in the continental U.S. These deaths are in addition to the numerous other health effects that are caused by marine vessel emissions, including respiratory diseases, such as asthma, cardiopulmonary disease, and cancer.

Architectural Coatings Fee Rule Adopted

A t its June Meeting, the AQMD's Governing Board adopted Rule 314, in order to assess and recover the program costs to the AQMD for implementing Rule 1113 (Architectural Coatings), and including the program's fair share of AQMD costs that are apportioned among all AQMD programs, such as personnel, payroll, etc.

The rule will also provide staff with architectural coating quantity and emission data information for planning, compliance, and rule development. The rule also addresses the function of staff assigned to inspections, planning, and rule development, laboratory services, legal, administrative, and monitoring and analysis as well as support personnel.

Under the provisions of Rule 314, architectural coating manufacturers are required to:

- Apply for company identification number unless they already have one in AQMD records.
- Submit an Annual Quantity and

Emissions Report certified by a Responsible Party.

- Maintain sufficient records to verify data necessary to determine annual architectural coating sales and VOC emissions in the District, and compliance with applicable rules and regulations.
- Use approved test methods to determine VOC content of the coatings.

The fees for architectural coatings are authorized by the California Health and Safety Code and are based on the annual quantity and associated emissions from architectural coatings, distributed or sold for use in the AQMD's jurisdiction. Rule 314 also requires architectural coatings manufacturers to provide a list of all their distributors located in the U.S.; and includes an exemption from fees for architectural coatings containing 5 grams or less of Volatile Organic Compounds (VOC) per liter of material. The cost of the program, which

includes the strengthening of the enforcement and laboratory efforts dedicated to the program, is projected to be approximately \$4.6 million for 2009-10, which equates to approximately 8 cents per gallon, based on estimated quantity of coatings, and is anticipated to be passed on to the end-user by the manufacturers. Staff estimates that the rule will impact approximately 200 architectural coating manufacturers.

Fire Safety Health Tips Available ring Wildfire Season

Α s the Southland prepares for yet another long and hot summer fire season, the AQMD wants area residents to know that there is information already available for them on all the measures that we can take to protect our health from the harmful pollutants filling the air during wildfires.

In recent years, in order to help protect the public's health from the ill effects of smoke and ash from fires, the AQMD has produced and made available Fire Safety Alert Tip information sheets. The three information sheets include: Tips for Residents; Tips for Children; and Tips for Seniors

The tips in these three information sheets for residents, children, and seniors, all provide guidance that individuals and families can follow to protect themselves from being exposed to unhealthful air during fires. Some of the tips include:

Everyone avoid all vigorous exertion, indoors or out;

Residents with heart disease, respiratory diseases including asthma, as well as the elderly and children remain indoors.

Keep windows and doors closed unless it is extremely hot inside, in which case, seek alternative shelter; and

Turn on air conditioner if you have one. Keep the fresh air intake closed and the filter clean to minimize outdoor smoke entering the house.

EnviroFlash is a free system that the EPA has partnered with AQMD on to provide the public with easy access to national and local air quality information. Your e-mail notification will show your forecast, tips for limiting

your exposure to pollution and helpful hints for reducing your own contribution to air pollution. Signing up is easy. Go to EnviroFlash at www. enviroflash info and just set your preferences and you can get a message every day, or only on days when air pollution reaches a certain level.

In our busy world it can be easy to forget to check the air quality forecast. That's where EnviroFlash can help. Your notification will show your forecast, tips for limiting your exposure to pollution and helpful hints for reducing your own contribution to air pollution. Receiving this information is very important during our current local smog

> season (May 1 until October 3), especially for parents, teachers, coaches, day care providers, and anyone who supervises active children, adults, the elderly, and those with respiratory disease such as asthma, and heart and cardiovascular diseases.

Air quality affects how you live and breathe. Knowing your air quality forecast and understanding the Air Quality Index (AQI) can help you plan your daily activities and reduce your exposure to pollution. The AQI is the color-based index for reporting daily air quality; including how clean or polluted the

outdoor air is in a specific location and what associated health effects may result for the local population.

Proposed Rule 433 - Natural Gas Fuel Specification -

The proposed rule would reduce emissions of NOx by establishing an upper higher-heating value limit for natural gas fuel. For information, contact Joe Cassmassi at (909) 396-3155 or jcassmassi@aqmd.gov.

Proposed Amended Rule 1108 - Cutback Asphalt -

Proposed Amended Rule 1146 - Emissions of Oxides of Nitrogen from Industrial, Institutional, and Commercial Boilers, Steam Generators and Process Heaters – The AQMD is currently proposing to reduce the allowable NOx emission limits from 30 ppm to 12, 9 or 5 ppm, depending on equipment size and operational characteristics, as well as recognizing energy efficiency. Proposed compliance limits for units burning landfill or digester gases are 25 and 15 ppm, respectively. Other proposed changes include requiring annual tune-up procedures and monthly maintenance procedures, limiting time to derate equipment, and applying a 30 ppm limit to low fuel usage equipment by January 1, 2015 or at burner replacement, whichever occurs later.

Proposed Amended Rule 1146.1 - Emissions of Oxides of Nitrogen from Small Industrial, Institutional, and Commercial Boilers, Steam Generators and Process Heaters – The proposed amendment to this rule would reduce the allowable emission limits of NOx from units with the application of low-NOx or ultra low-NOx burners with or without the use of flue gas recirculation (FGR). It is also the intent of this proposed amendment to harmonize the NOx compliance limits with those limits proposed for Rule 1146 and established in Rule 1146.2.

Proposed Rule 1147 - NOx Reductions from Miscellaneous Sources -The proposed rule will require combustion equipment not regulated by existing rules to meet emission limits for nitrogen oxides. For information, contact Joe Cassmassi at (909) 396-3155 or jcassmassi@aqmd.gov.
