
Here are a few reasons that are pushing me over the edge:

Hon. Mr. Chen:

It appears that the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) is unfamiliar with physics and electrical engineering. Using electricity to produce heating is far less efficient than using natural gas. There is a loss of energy when transporting electricity. Transporting electrical power about 3,000 miles results in delivering about one-half of the power generated. The impact to the electrical grid would be debilitating, especially in summer.
